I first used the Internet in fall 1993, as a Fulbright Scholar at Charles University in Prague. The stunning growth of the Internet—resulting in 24 trillion email messages sent in 2005, and more than 600 billion Web pages and 50 million blogs online in the same year—has helped make possible the development of English as the world's first global language.
